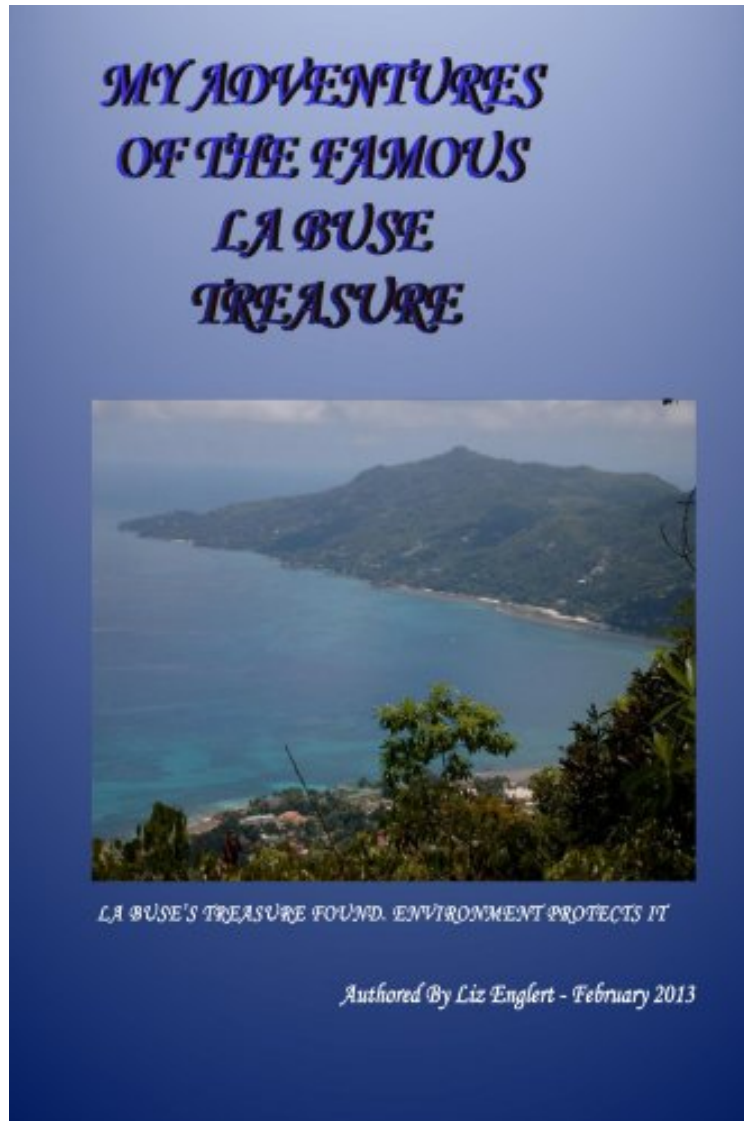

history and the famous and beautiful Seychelles. My hope was to find some information about secret trails to go by myself on an adventure tour - not to find a treasure but more to find stones with signs from pirates - so real history. Now about the book: The book is somewhat composed like a diary. That means you shouldn't expect a novel. Liz often repeats some parts - a little bit too often in my opinion. The book is very short. It has also some problems with the pictures jumping from page to page on my Kindle. Better read it online in the cloud - there you could also see the pictures colored. It seems sometimes that Liz hurried up the book too much. That could be improved in a further version. Reads not very good so why do I give 4 stars? First, if you look on social networks and see what Liz is doing on Seychelles you quickly realize that Liz is a good person. She worked with children, helps to keep the Seychelles as beautiful as they are - e.g. she stands up against hotel builds in areas where never ever should be a hotel - and she wrote this book instead of keeping her knowledge for her own. Second, the book gives many informations and a background story of La Buse. She also describes where the treasure should be. I personally don't think that I understand this part correct because then it's not near Bel Ombre. As I interpreted, it should be near Port Launay Waterfalls (a well known place). But maybe I'm wrong there... All in all Liz gives us with this book a very nice impulse for hiking and thinking twice. So 4 stars and some money for helping Liz to get the treasure some day is it worth to read ;-)

Kurzbeschreibung In the early 1700s, pirates roamed the Indian Ocean looking for secret places to hide their ill-gotten treasures. Seychelles was one of those islands, that pirates found refuge, where they could also repair their boats and reload them with fresh water and fruits. Olivier Le Vasseur (aka La Buse), was one of the most famous pirates of that time. In 1730, La Buse was captured and hanged in Reunion. On the way to the scaffold, he flung a parchment into the crowd with the words "Find my treasure he who can". The parchment contained secret codes that have been decoded and can be found on the web. I spent 7 years researching about La Buse and his treasure. Do you think I have found it? With a vision to let the world know about such a finding, the benefit that this would bring to the Seychelles economy is endless, I hope this book would open the door to something that could benefit Seychelles and that a team should come together to prove me wrong, before the treasure is taken illegally and never to be seen like some rumours of the past. There is not only the history itself that comes with the treasure but also the tourism industry that would benefit from such a finding.

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ber den Autor und weitere Mitwirkende When I was a little girl growing up in the Seychelles, I used to spend my time listening to stories told by my grandmother. Little did I know that today those stories would assist me to locate the burial site of one of the most wonderful pirate treasures in history. Seychelles is a group of 115 islands scattered across the Indian Ocean. Its closest neighbour is about 1000 miles away. It is free from any cyclones and has a yearly average temperature of 28 degrees. The bright golden sun rises over the Eastern horizon every morning to the awe of most inhabitants. Visitors watch the sunset over Silhouette every day, while sitting on the beach at Beau Vallon, sipping a cold Seybrew beer or sucking the fresh juice of the coconut gathered from a nearby tree. Silhouette is the 3rd largest island of the group. The turquoise blue waters caress its white sandy beaches where tourists and locals alike enjoy a stroll. Many overseas visitors are taking advantage of these settings to enhance the most precious and romantic day of their lives to get married. Because of its equatorial climate, the vegetation stays lush all year round. Over 50% of the Seychelles natural habitat is protected by the International Environmental Organisations. Seychelles boasts not only the world's largest nut, but one which is recorded in the Guinness Book of World Records. This nut is called the Coco De Mer, and is also a protected and endangered species. It can be found mainly on Praslin, the 2nd largest island of the group, although we now have a few other places that they can be found growing. It takes about 25 years for a Coco De Mer nut to be fully mature for harvesting. Looking at both the male and female Coco De Mer, it is not hard to see what they resemble.
