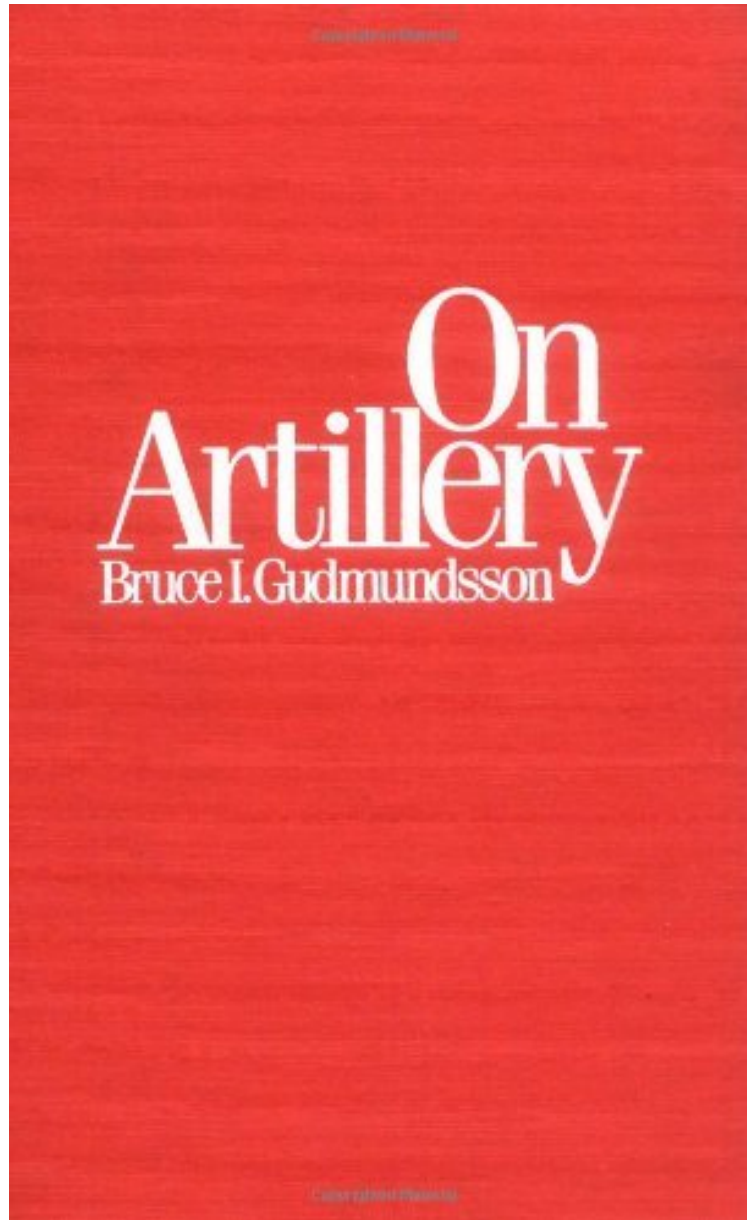

It shows the development of "goddess of war" in its tactical application and is thus very useful for those, who have a more generalist bend and want to know, what artillery can do - not how these results are achieved. So if you want a superb introduction, you do not need to look further. I think, this is a must for every person, who has to deal with gunners in any professional capacity. I do believe, that especially ROTC members could gain a lot by reading this little book. Gunners on the other hand will learn something about the history of Artillery and especially about different traditions in the use of "the long arm" during the great wars, but might find this book a little too unspecific to have much application in their job.
